Shelter/ Non-food items psychosocial

- **464** mud-brick shelters for **423** households (HHs) continued to be built in Pulka, Gwoza and Ngala local government areas (LGAs), Borno State. Between November 2021 and May 2022, **348** mud-brick shelters have been constructed. The shelters are equipped with latrines and showers for each household.
- The construction of **215** mud-brick shelters and **185** latrines for 182 households in Malkohi, Adamawa State, is ongoing.
- IOM completed the rehabilitation of **28** buildings for **157** HHs at GSSS Bama, Borno State.
- IOM constructed **500** shelters in Magumeri LGA, Borno State, for the IDPs whose properties were destroyed during a fire outbreak in Gajiganna in March 2022. IOM provided 39 NFI kits with mattresses to the same number of HHs in Borno State to enhance IDP's well-being and protection.



Camp Coordination and Camps Management

- **3,494** newly displaced households, (11,966 individuals), were received, registered, and sensitised at IOM-managed reception centres in Borno State's Gwoza and Bama LGAs.
- **168** complaints were received and documented at IOM-managed complaints and feedback desks. 89 of the complaints were resolved/closed and referred to partners via the complaints and feedback mechanisms, while 79 remained open. In Borno and Adamawa States, **151,461** individuals, were sensitised on fire safety, cholera awareness, and hygiene promotion.



Water, sanitation and hygiene

- **65,948,543** litres of water from boreholes, hand pumps, and water trucking were delivered to IDPs and host communities in Borno and Adamawa States.
- **1,595** latrines and **914** shower stances were rehabilitated in Borno and Adamawa States.
- **157,095** individuals were reached with hygiene promotion messages on cholera and COVID-19 prevention across all IOM WASH-managed camps. This was achieved through door-to-door radio programmes, mass campaigns, and peer-to-peer engagement in Borno and Adamawa States.



Early Recovery and Livelihood

- **30** beneficiaries in Bama, Borno LGAs took part in carpentry training and were provided with a start-up kit. The trainees will continue engaging with the shelter team.



Mental health and psychosocial support (Protection)

- **27,639** individuals, benefited from MHPSS/Protection services and activities in Adamawa, Borno, and Yobe States. Out of the total, **2,341** were new beneficiaries. MHPSS teams engaged project participants and host community members in services and activities that promote positive coping strategies and equipped them with relevant social skills and techniques needed for an effective return, local reintegration or, resettlement. These include family/group support techniques, problem-solving, decision-making , interpersonal and analytical skills..

Disengagement Disassociation Reintegration and Reconciliation (DDRR)

- On 29 March 2022, under the EU consortium “Support for Reconciliation and Reintegration of Former Armed Non-State Combatants and Boko Haram Associates (S2R)” IOM, and the consortium partners (UNDP and UNICEF) facilitated the second steering committee meeting. The meeting presented an opportunity to share perspectives on community preparedness for the reintegration of low-risk former associates.
- Following the graduation of the fourth group of beneficiaries from the Operation Safe Corridor (OPSC) rehabilitation programme in February 2022, **180** out of **539** graduates were transferred from the OPSC Centre to Bulumkutu Interim Care Centre (BICC) in Maiduguri, Borno State on 19 April 2022. IOM will continue to provide support in preparation for their reintegration process.

Assistance to Vulnerable Migrants

- Two trainings on harmonised identification, screening and reporting tools for Victims of Trafficking (VoTs) were held in March 2022 in Abuja and Keffi. At the end of the training, the **55** participants were conversant in the uses of the tools. Among the attendees were members of the State Task Forces on Human Trafficking from Plateau, Benue and Nasarawa States and NAPTIP staff.
- **46** VoTs took part in an extensive skills development and capacity building training to improve and grow their businesses. The Extensive Business Skills (EBST) training took place in Lagos from 21 February to 4 March 2022. At the beginning of the EBST session, 12% of the participants indicated they had little but not enough knowledge to start their own business. After the training 85% indicated they had gained enough knowledge to start their own business. During the EBST, a session on the Prevention of Sexual Exploitation and Abuse (PSEA) was conducted for the beneficiaries. The objective of this session was to help participants understand the definition of the terms and urge them to report any cases of SEA.
- As a follow-up training to the EBST on 5 and 6 March 2022, the beneficiaries had the privilege to learn skills ranging from production of liquid soap, perfume, disinfectant, household bleach, antiseptic, air freshener, petroleum jelly, hair cream and other beauty products.
- **29** stakeholders working closely with IOM took part in a training course on PSEA held in Abuja on 7 and 8 March 2022. The training aimed at building the capacity of participants on issues of SEA and how to respond if faced with such issues. As a follow up training of the PSEA, IOM carried out a step-down training for non-state child protection actors in the South-West from 23 to 25 March 2022 in Ibadan, Oyo State. **40** participants were taken through issues of Trafficking in Persons, Smuggling of Migrants and reunification and reintegration of minors.
- On 28 April 2022, IOM assisted NAPTIP with hosting the National Stakeholders Consultative Forum which serves as a forum to integrate stakeholders at all levels and ensure that those whose mandate directly aligns with NAPTIP are brought together to synergise on effective strategies to eliminate the crime. During the event, NAPTIP launched three national policy documents: 1) National Action Plan on Human Trafficking (2022-2026); 2) National Policy for Protection and Assistance to Victims of Trafficking and; 3) Protocol for Identification, Safe Return and Reintegration of Trafficked Persons.

Mental health and psychosocial support

- To ensure a sustainable reintegration for returned migrants and enhanced social support by caregivers of returned migrants, **24** stakeholders participated in a workshop to develop a “Mental Health and Psychosocial Support (MHPSS) caregiver's” booklet. The workshop was held from 14 to 18 March 2022 in Abuja. This community-based approach and the booklet are aimed to guide caregivers in providing care to returned migrants with multiple vulnerabilities.
- On 21 March 2022, 46 persons participated in a psychoeducation session during the “Start Your Business” (SYB) training in Lagos. As part of the psychosocial reintegration support offered to migrants upon return and to further prepare migrants for proper livelihood activity, this session was structured to increase migrants self-awareness and acceptance while embracing hope and strengthening resilience.

Awareness Raising

- Pulse Nigeria, a leading digital media firm based in Lagos, delivered a content creation and publication training for **18** Migrant As Messengers (MaM) volunteers and a social media influencer, in Lagos from 20-22 April 2022. The objective was to enhance their knowledge and capacity in digital content creation and publication and learn ways to effectively use social media to reach people and engage in discussions that can change people's perceptions on migration issues.
- Eight MaM volunteers carried out a Motor Park sensitisation activity at the Obakawaye Central Park in Benin City on 8 April 2022. The campaign was designed to raise awareness of the risks and dangers of irregular migration through sharing of information on alternatives for safe migration including opportunities in their home countries. Volunteers engaged motorists and their passengers through role-play demonstrating the tactics used by traffickers to lure unsuspected victims. The volunteers reached **244** persons in total.
- Three MaM volunteers in collaboration with Female Returnee Network (FERNET), reached **108** women from three schools during a sensitisation on the dangers of irregular migration in Koye Oke community, Lagos State, on 1 April 2022. The volunteers shared their knowledge with students about the dangers of irregular migration and the legal ways to travel. They shared their own experiences to help students understand better how traffickers operate in communities.

Assisted Voluntary Return and Reintegration

- In response to challenges and addressing gaps in Return, Readmission and Reintegration in Nigeria, IOM is working with National Commission For Refugees, Migrants and Internally Displaced persons (NCFRMI) and other key agencies on the establishment of Reintegration Hubs (RHs) in key states (Kano, Delta, and Oyo) with high number of returns, irregular migration hotspots, and cities near to remote areas with poor or no mobile network facility. This initiative will support key actors by providing returned and potential migrants with sustainable reintegration and information with regards to AVRR processes.
- To foster sustainable reintegration through partnerships, IOM partnered with Hydroponic Wells Hosa Greenhouse Farm to provide employment to **50** beneficiaries
- To ensure the sustainability of the reintegration assistance provided to returned migrants, **607** returnees were trained in March and April on how to start and manage successful businesses


Migration Data Management

- IOM in collaboration with the National Population Commission and National Bureau of Statistics, under the auspices of the EUTF-IOM Special Measure Project (SMP) in Nigeria, organised the second three-day capacity building workshop on Migration Data Dissemination in Kano, Nigeria on 16-18 March 2022. 25 participants were trained on this topic. Workshop's main objective was to enhance effective dissemination, collaboration, coordination, and information sharing among all stakeholders involved in migration data management.
- In collaboration with the National Population Commission and National Bureau of Statistics, under the auspices of SMP, IOM organised a three-day capacity building training on Migration Data Management in Benin City on 5-7 April 2022. 18 participants learned how to enhance the collection, collation, processing, and analysis of migration data generated by Ministries Department and Agencies (MDAs).

Flow Monitoring

The Flow Monitoring tool collects data on migration flows and trends, traveller profiles, migration journeys, and migration intentions, to obtain clear overview of mobility in West and Central Africa. This kind information facilitates decision-making when implementing migration programmes in Nigeria to prevent irregular migration.

On average 1,139 individuals were observed at the five Flow Monitoring Points in Nigeria on a daily basis in March 2022. The number decreased to 894 on average in April.

Displacement Tracking Matrix


- **26,635** individuals (10,170 households) were biometrically registered and **56,881** individuals (14,010 households) were verified in six LGAs, five in Borno State (Gwoza, Ngala, Monguno, Bama, and Damboa) and one in Adamawa state (Yola). The registration process will enhance evidence-based interventions for the new arrivals and returnees.
- **2,489** children were screened for Mid-Upper Arm Circumference (MUAC) across Bama and Gwoza LGAs, Borno State.
- IOM's DTM tracked the movements of **1,588** persons from three Points of Entry in Borno State. 348,125 movements were observed from ten flow monitoring points in the North-Eastern states. There were 151,330 inflows and 196,795 outflows out of the total.

Immigration Border Management

IOM in conjunction with the Nigeria Immigration Service (NIS) organised its first Migration Information and Data Analysis System (MIDAS) Working Group Meeting for 2022 on 10-11 March in Lagos to discuss on progress made on IBM's current country portfolio, the introduction of new projects, and promote synergies between NIS-IOM and other stakeholders.


Assessment of three proposed new sites for Personnel Training Resource Centers (PTRC) establishment took place between 9-13 March 2022. Site locations include NIS Abia, Rivers and Kwara State Commands.

A total of **50** NIS officers were trained on information security and data management. From 20 February until 7 March, MIDAS for foreigner registration installations took place in Lagos Zone A, Ogun, Oyo, Kwara, Rivers, Delta, Plateau, Borno, Taraba, Adamawa, Sokoto, Kebbi, Zamfara, Jigawa, Ebonyi, Enugu, Imo, Akwa Ibom, Katsina NIS State Commands.
